**<u>Reception</u>** - have been reading the stories of Oliver's Fruit Salad and The Enormous Watermelon. Some children went to the Co-op to purchase a selection of fruit. We used our senses to explore the fruit and made some careful observational drawings of the outside and insides of various fruits. In maths we have been learning about odd and even numbers. In games we are working hard to practise our throwing and catching skills using balls and beanbags. On Thursday during Collective Worship, the Reception children were welcomed in to their school house of either Mars, Saturn, Neptune or Jupiter. Each child has been presented with a certificate stating what house they are in.



<u>KS1</u> – In Maths, KS1 have been learning to tell the time. Year 2 have been looking at "o" clock, quarter to, quarter past and half past. All of KS1 have enjoyed their new book in English 'The lighthouse keeper's lunch', and have been exploring speech within the text. In their topic work it has been lovely to see how hard they have all been working to learn about how entertainment has changed by the seaside. They even watched a Punch and Judy show!

**LKS2** –have been working on writing a newspaper report about Professor Jelly and Professor Grimstone's activity at the National History Museum, from finding the sarcophagus of Sennapod to capturing the Lightspeeds and shooting their Blunderbuss full of chocolate and sweets! Maths has seen lots of fraction work across all three classes. Miss Eaves's class have continued their Ancient Egypt topic with researching about the gods and goddesses and creating fact files based on Ra, Horus or Hathor. In RE, they have explored the Golden Rule within a variety of religions and explored the concept of 'Pay It Forward', discussing a variety of ways they can show kindness on a daily basis.

<u>UKS2</u> – This week, Year 5 and 6 have been researching Alberto Giacometti as part of their People in Action project in art. The children have been learning all about movement and the different techniques artists use to show movement within pieces of artwork. As one of the most important sculptures of the 20<sup>th</sup> century, the children have been looking at examples of Giacometti's work and have been exploring how he used long, tall sculptures to represent people moving. Fascinatingly, the children learnt that Giacometti wasn't sculpting the human body, but the shadows it cast!

<u>Twinning project</u> - Yesterday, children in Year 4 had an exciting morning working with local photographer Nick Priest, who is working on a project with Bidford-on-Avon's twin town: Ebsdorfergrund in Germany. Year 4 were tasked with manipulating Nick's photos of Bidford and Ebsdorfergrund to create new outcomes using any creative method they could think of! The children had a lot of fun and created some fantastic pieces of artwork which will be shared with the children in Ebsdorfergrund. Over the next year, Nick will continue to develop the project and we hope to create more communication with our twin town!







<u>Sleep hygiene –</u> Some of our pupils in Year 6 have been working on posters to help encourage good bedtime routines. Earlier this year they had a sleep hygiene workshop and have also been learning more recently about the benefits of having a good night sleep. Please see the poster attached.
