<u>Reception –</u> have been learning about autumn time. They began their learning with a walk around the school grounds and enjoyed collecting leaves of different shapes, sizes and colours. We read the story of "Leaf Man" by Lois Ehlert and created our own pictures using natural resources. The children have created some beautiful autumn tree pictures too.

<u>KS1 –</u> have been learning about the golden rule in Christianity. We have explored our own world view and focused on Sikhism and Hinduism. The children have been extremely respectful and have enjoyed learning about the collective duty of the Sikh people. In addition, we have been reading autumn poetry and the children have enjoyed going an autumn walk. To conclude, the children have worked extremely hard this half term and should be proud of themselves.

LKS2 (Y3, Y3/4 & Y4) — absolutely loved their trip to Bishops Wood and their Roman experience. The children learnt lots of new Latin phrases and discovered lots of things that the Romans introduced to our country. These included stinging nettles, cats and carrots! They were also given the opportunity to perform a Roman play for the Emperor! Plays included: The eruption of Mount Vesuvius, The origin of the seasons and How Julius Caesar was murdered! Most of the children's favourite activity was to put up their own tents and building their own Roman road. We were very impressed with the children's Roman knowledge on the day, and it was fantastic to see them having such a wonderful time, learning new things.







<u>UKS2 (Y5, Y5/6 & Y6)</u> – In science, we have been researching Charles Darwin. We have studied his early childhood, education and career, as well as his famous voyage on the HMS Beagle! The children enjoyed learning about the discoveries he made whilst he explored the Galápagos Islands, which eventually led to his Theory of Evolution.


<u>Bellboating Regatta</u> – Children from Year 5/6 took part in the bellboating regatta on the River Avon at Stratford Upon Avon today. All children had loads of fun and really enjoyed themselves.
