

Reception – have started their new topic; 'All Creatures Great and Small'. The focus for this week's learning has been on humans. The children have been looking at baby photographs and made observations as to how they are growing and changing. They have been naming parts of the body and used the story 'Funny Bones' to learn about our skeleton. They made their own skeleton pictures using cotton buds, straws and chalk. They have also









KS1 (Y1, Y1/2 & Y2) – have settled back into school life and our routines really well. Year 2 have been learning all about the 2, 5 and 10 times tables. Whilst Year 1 have been revising place value, addition and subtraction. In English, we have been looking at instructional writing, practicing being bossy with our imperative verbs and adding adverbs to our writing. The children have really enjoyed following instructions to make jam sandwiches and writing/editing instructions to accompany this experience. Plus, we also really enjoyed eating them! We are very excited for our Frozen planet topic day next week.








LKS2 (Y3, Y3/4 & Y4) – have come back to school after half term with a super attitude! The children have started to look at how advertising can be used, and focused on the importance of features such as hyperbole - they're very good at exaggerating things! They will be using the features to write their own advert for Thor'sday Thursday from 'How to train your dragon'! History has seen us completing research about the life during the Viking period - an event that includes the ugliest baby competition, gull's egg eating competition and the dragon initiation test. Fox Class have been working hard on consolidating their division skills especially with remainders. Year 4 have enjoyed their first computing lesson about animation and impressed with their funny animations using frames.

KS2 (Y5, Y5/6 & Y6) — have been learning about the Coventry Blitz, which took place on November 14, 1940. During this devastating event, over 30,000 incendiary bombs were dropped on the city, causing widespread destruction. One of the most significant losses was Coventry Cathedral, which was nearly destroyed by the bombing, though the ruins have since become a symbol of resilience and peace. As part of their studies, the children have begun writing their own short newspaper excerpts about the bombings, reflecting on the impact this historical event had on the city and its people. Year 6 Pupils have also made a positive start to their SATs practice.

Stop norovirus spreading

Norovirus, also known as the 'winter vomiting bug', is the most common stomach bug in the UK. It can spread easily through close contact, or by contaminated surfaces, food or water.


The main symptoms of norovirus include a sudden onset of nausea, followed by projectile vomiting and diarrhoea, usually 1 to 2 days after becoming infected. Other common symptoms include a high fever, a headache and aching arms and legs.

Good hand hygiene is important to stop norovirus spreading.

To stop norovirus spreading, you should:

- wash your hands thoroughly using soap and warm water after using the toilet or contact with a sick individual and before preparing and eating food.
- stay off school or work until you have not been sick or had diarrhoea for at least two days
- not rely on alcohol gels instead of washing your hands, as these do not kill the virus
- wash any contaminated clothing or bedding using detergent at 60°C using disposable gloves to handle any items
- use bleach-based cleaners to disinfect surfaces

If you catch it, stay home for 48 hours after your symptoms clear



Most people will make a full recovery in 2-3 days without needing any medicine. It is important to keep hydrated – especially children and the elderly.

Try not to visit A&E or GP surgeries if you have symptoms of norovirus unless advised to do so by a healthcare professional, as this may spread the bug to others. Call ahead to a GP or ring NHS 111 if you are worried about your symptoms.




