Transport Reception home learning

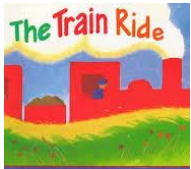

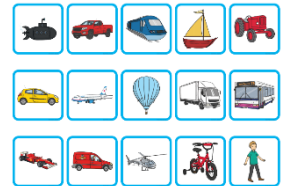


Can you help Mr Bump find his matching bumper car by looking carefully at the patterns?
