Look at different types of transport. Talk about when we would use them, where we would go, and who would use them?

What transport helps us? E.g. Ambulances, bin lorries. Think about how they help us. Write some key words or a sentence with a picture of a mode of transport that helps us.

Ask members of your family their favourite type of transport, make a tally chart and with an adult turn it into a graph. Below is a link to a bar graph





Create a form of transport using recycling from your house. Think carefully how you will attach the pieces.
